The Blessings of Spring: A Time to Listen & Renew As April arrives, the world around us awakens from its winter slumber. The days grow longer, the earth softens, and the first green shoots of life push their way through the soil. Elisha's Corner Memorials

As early as the 16th and 17th centuries, memorials-in-memory-of gifts were provided to churches to ensure that loved ones and people of prominence or popularity were remembered by future generations. Some may have even been in payment of absolution for the deceased. The more prominently lasting memorials would have been on stained glass for church widows or blinds. This practice was carried into the 19th century in Monroe with the old stained glass windows installed in the East Village Methodist Church. None, of course, were provided to either of our original Meeting Houses' windows. We do, however, have records of memorial gifts in memory of members and non-members of our congregation.

In our Rexford House hall, to the right side of the entrance to Dineson Parlor, there is a stand holding a shadow box wherein lies our official **Book of Remembrance.** The book itself is a memorial gift given in 1958 by Miss Clare M. Johnson (cousin of Olen

Beardsley's wife, Martha Merrill) in memory of Mabel Huntley Johnson, wife of Herbert B. Johnson. Therein are the calligraphy written records of gifts made to our congregation "in the memory of loved ones", both monetary and articles. The stand and shadow box repository, too, is a gift. It was dedicated in 1961 to the memory of Louis B. Beardsley and given by his wife, Alice B. Beardsley, and their sons Roger and his wife, Ester, and Earl and his wife, Grace. Monetary gifts memorializing designated loved ones are recorded for the church building fund specifically for needed equipment and furniture and were deposited in a Passbook Saving Account opened on Dec. 6, 1967. Such memorial gifts are in addition to the many outright gifts of money and a sundry of items useful to our campus without memorializing anyone.

The **Book** resides in the care of the Deacons as does the monetary donations; like those given in the name of Alice Beardsley in 1977 for books for our library, or Mabel and Margret Burr in 1978 to 1980, as well as Edna DuBail in 1980, Jack Paul in 1977, or William C. Mitchell established by his wife Elsie in 1977, and William Soukup established by his wife Mae in 1980. Some memorial monetary funds were established out of persons' wills or trusts, like that of Robert Sinclair, who you may remember donated the property upon which Beardsley Hal was erected. It was dedicated by his wife Marjorie in 1995. The memorial bequeathed by Clara M. Johnson in her will was in the form of "five equal shares of the (remaining undivided portion of her property) in memory of (her) grandparents, James C. Johnson and Marietta Beardsley Johnson, and of (her) father, Seymour J. Johnson, to be held in trust in perpetuity, with the income therefrom to be used annually for the care, maintenance and upkeep of the Church building and for the Pastor's salary".

Most of the memorial entries in the Book and the supporting documents filed in our archives is monetary gifts, but there are articles of lasting preservation as well. In the rear entrance to our Meeting house there is a Cross atop the cement wall in memory of Willard B. Stanley, 1878 - 1952. On the wall of our chancel hangs a 48" cross from the Wiemer Memorial Fund in memory of Rev. Theodore C. Wiemer gifted in 1973 along with two 10" candlesticks on the communion table. On the deacons podium rests the Bible given by Sue Zaleha in memory of her husband, George, who presented the name "Rexford House" to a voting congregation. In 1961, Sue and George gifted communion linens to memory of William H. Zaleha. Offering plates were given in 1967 to the memory of Gertrude Reetz, 1886 - 1966, by her daughter, Helen Reetz Hauenstein. At the same time offering plates were also given in memory of John G. Hopper by his daughter, Josephine Hopper Schoonmacker, and by the Barsumian and Junkins families, and by Rev. W. Raymond Ward in memory of his father William E. Ward. In 1983, pew cushions were donated to the memory of Emma Wilton by Charles and Lillian Wilton and many others. The hand bells in our balcony are a 1985 gift from Edward Helland, in loving memory of his wife and choir member, Barbara Louise Helland. And the carriage lights adorning each side of the Meeting House front door were given by Mae Soukup in loving memory of her husband, William in 1982. All these treasure of our congregation, and more, were given in memory of loved ones who concluded their careers and service in life, as well as experiencing the pleasure and love of their grandchildren. There are also entries of gifted treasures in the **Book** that memorialize those whose lives were cut short all too soon, for whatever reasons known only to God. Four of them come to mind immediately.

First is a brass bud vase that was given in July of 1977, by Evelyn and John Smith in memory of their infant son, Howard James Smith, and the grandson of Jean and Audrey Smith. At the start of the Strawberry Festival every year we gather in a circle around the second one; a "weeping cherry tree planted on the church grounds" behind Beardsley Hall. It was given by Sue Day, a former director of our choir, and by members of our congregation at the time, whose names fill five pages of the **Book**, in memory of Sue's son, Mark Day. Mark was an active PFer who became a missionary in his early twenties. He fell from the roof top of a house he was helping to build in a mission village in Africa. The third is the "Peace Pole" in the garden behind our Meeting House, giving by Joyce and Gilles Rousseau in loving memory of daughter, Lauren, teacher and victim of the Sandy Hook Elementary School tragedy. The bench in front of the church office in Rexford House




was also given to memorialize her and four of her colleagues. The fourth treasure precipitated this tour through the **Book** and records in our archives to answer a question about it.

It is the weathervane atop our church steeple which was given by the family of Harold and Betsy Prall, in loving memory of their son, Eugene Dudley Prall, who died at age 22, a victim of a head-on automobile collision on the River Road in Shelton on the morning of May 3, 1972. It was installed in 1973 while repairs to our steeple were being made. The bird on the weathervane is a "crowing cock" (a rooster). Perhaps it is a Lenten season lesson to us not to deny Jesus Christ in our lives, as did Peter the apostle. Thank you, David Walker, for the question.


