Yesterday, during a break in PF programming, I had the opportunity to sit down and talk to some of our young people about my upcoming sabbatical from July 1<sup>st</sup> through September 30<sup>th</sup>. The realization that I won't be on their summer mission trip has been difficult for some of them. It's hard for me too. I will miss being there for our seniors as they get nostalgic and talk about their experiences and memories of our time together. I

will miss the excitement of our freshman as they travel a long way to repair housing for folks in West Virginia. I will miss the adults and college students as we work together bringing the group ever closer to their goal of helping people.

As I tried to explain to them the purpose of pastoral sabbaticals, it occurred to me that maybe they aren't the only ones that are wondering about why we do it. In part, this time away is supposed to help the community 'own' more of their ministry and learn ways we may be more effective in working together. Sabbaticals have a way of breaking unhelpful patterns in church systems, to make room for creativity and joy.

Pastors tend to be workaholic people pleasers who want to be there for our community as they experience crisis, even on our days off or late at night when we should otherwise be resting. And yet, congregations may suffer from ministry by ministers who experience prolonged periods of stress. To lead effectively, clergy must be able to emotionally handle periods of extended burnout and compassion fatigue.

Reentry from a sabbatical takes a time of adjustment – I won't know everything about MCC that happened while I was away. One wise seminary professor once remarked, "It is not possible to board a moving train with a perpendicular leap." I may need to run alongside you for a while to catch up with the church's momentum.

The sabbatical is an important event in the life of both pastor and congregation. It is one of the most effective ways for clergy and congregation to develop and maintain a long-term relationship. It can be a vital ingredient in a mutually beneficial relationship. Ultimately, may we all find a new sense of refreshment, so that we can be ready to take on new tasks in growing the kin-dom.

You will all be in good hands with our excellent church council, key volunteers, and sabbatical supply pastor, Rev. Peggy Allen. I greatly look forward to hearing how you took the summer to rest and recuperate from a busy season of being church, and how you started the program year off in September. See you in October!

### Elisha's Corner By Gary Thompson, Church Historian

### **Strawberry Festival's 50<sup>th</sup> Anniversary**

Fifty years doesn't seem like very long ago, but as an anniversary it is worth the celebration! Fifty years ago this June, knowing the story of how money was raised to purchase the Centre Green one hundred years earlier in 1872, Connie Keeling, wife of our then Pastor Rev. Robert Keeling, was instrumental in resurrecting the Strawberry Festival in 1972. The purpose was to raise money to support the payments for the Rexford House mortgage. It was held on a Saturday, June 24<sup>th</sup> with a rain date Sunday, the 25<sup>th</sup> from noon to 7 P.M. It was the weekend after the Father's Day weekend, to coincide with the Monroe Arts Exhibit held on the Centre Green. The event was scheduled for both Saturday and Sunday the following year and then latter to the two days of the Father's Day weekend when the berries were the ripest. From the beginning, committees were manned to pick strawberries at Jones' Family Farm in Huntington, sort them, and hull them for sale in quarts, in pies, and in shortcake. The kitchen was manned by the ladies of the Church and the special biscuits, from a close kept secret recipe, were baked by Sue and Joyce (Zaleha) Rousseau (mother and daughter) for the short cake served on the parsonage lawn. In subsequent years the Fellowship Hall in Rexford House served as the shortcake serving venue.

Lori Sippin remembers when Connie Keeling suggested it to the Women's Fellowship. She made dolls and worked that first festival year as a waitress, as did many of the ladies of the Morning Circle. Young girls of the church were not enlisted back then. "The first year the Festival was held only on Saturday", she says. Over the past forty-nine Festivals she has work on most every committee. And she has taken her turns at picking berries. When asked if there is a fondest memory of the Festival she replied, "No, not really, I liked them all." It rained during the 2<sup>nd</sup> and 3<sup>rd</sup> Festival, "we held it anyway, and everyone still had a good time".

There are more than a few fondest memories for Joyce Rousseau. She was in the hospital during the first Festival recovering from an auto accident she was in on the way home from her college graduation, but her mother, Sue, was. Sue was "the biscuit chairman", quoted the Newtown Bee on June 8, 1972. Joyce has been present in the kitchen for the last forty-eight years, though, working side by side with her "mom" for as long as Sue could do the baking. "It was always biscuits and pies," she says. The biscuit recipe was printed in the Festival's *Out of the Strawberry Patch* cook book in 1974. Her mom was the baker in the Fawn Hollow School cafeteria. That is where she got the recipe; and .... that is the close kept secret. Joyce remembers that the original pies were strawberry-rhubarb; but that they were so hard to make that they later used another recipe that they got from Jones' Tree Farm. As the story goes, Jim Davison went around to the houses of the ladies making the pies and transported them back to Rexford House in his station wagon. On one occasion, when his daughter was driving, she made a sudden stop and the fluid filling from the pies spilled all over the back of the wagon. It was incentive enough for Jim to find a better recipe.

Joyce says that "she kept a count on a piece of paper she kept in her apron pocket for Jim of the biscuits and pies they made. He wanted an accurate count. It was difficult taking the trays out of the oven while putting trays in and keeping a tally, too. She told him, "Forget it, Jim." Joyce's sister had made aprons for all the "kitchen ladies". What she remembers most fondly is how hard everyone worked year after year.

That memory was echoed by Ann Zeiner, who didn't start working in the kitchen until she retired about ten years after the Festival's start, but she was there every year after that. She cut berries, filled the pies, boxed them, and stored the pies in the "cooling room". She wasn't there yet when, as Joyce related, the pies were put on a ping-pong table in the "cooling room". The legs collapsed and the pies covered the floor. There were years when Ann's son, Allan, worked with her in the kitchen. It was from watching Sue Zaleha that he decided to go to culinary school and become a professional chef. Ann says that "it was just a real good time working in the kitchen." Jackie Bleakney, like Ann, didn't start working the Festival until she too, retired. She says that she's "worked at most of them if not all of them since."

In addition to the pies and the strawberry short cakes, the arts and the crafts were the inspirations of June Wilkes and Connie Keeling. June had been running the Monroe Arts Exhibit on the Centre Green each June. So for the first Strawberry Festival she says she required all of the exhibitors to include a strawberry theme in their works. In the following years it was opened to all types of art and crafts, and she became busy organizing and scheduling the crafters for many years. Connie organized the church women to make Raggedy Ann, sock monkey, and clown dolls which were sold from the large "Ye Olde Doll Shoppe" (a doll house) made by Jack Abbott. This was repeated for a number of the following years. The Men's Club was not to be outdone. Rip Ripley and Vern Nelson supervised a men's assembly line that produced bird houses made from scrap lumber obtained from the Monroe Lumber Yard (it used to be on the site of the Stepney shopping plaza). Don Whitely says he remembers that. He says that he was probably there with his wife, Janice, in the "sorting room".

Myron Wininger remembers the bird houses, too. He says that his contribution was providing the camping tarp that shaded the workers at the "servicing table" and picking berries. He also remembers taking his two hour shift at serving the shortcakes and then cleaning the tables. His wife, June, was the chairwomen for shortcake serving, and she says she was a waitress, like many of the Morning Circle ladies. She chaired the doll making, too. "There was so much work put into it", she says, "that we decided to hold it two days instead of the one." Over the last forty-nine years they both say that they may have missed only two Festivals.

As successful as the 1972 Strawberry Festival was and has become over the last forty-nine years it is hard to imagine that it almost did not happen at all. When Connie Keeling took her idea to the Board of Trustees in February of 1972, it was not well received at all. She was told that it was not worth the effort, but was finally told by a woman on the Trustees that if she thought it was such a good idea, "why don't you do it yourself". And so she did, to our lasting reward. Let that be a lesson to us. *Happy 50<sup>th</sup> Anniversary Strawberry Festival!*
