

When many people think of March, they think of St. Patrick's Day. You don't have to be Irish, however, to celebrate where you came from. I hope that you have been enjoying the *Elisha's Corner* articles written by our church historian Gary Thompson about where the

founders of MCC came from. They are highly informative and quite interesting to read. I am hoping to be able to visit some of the places in England that he mentions as part of my summer sabbatical.

I write to you today sitting in my den on a foggy late February morning, listening to the news out of the Ukraine and lighting a candle for peace. Yesterday I walked in the sunshine and enjoyed some backyard time. What are you celebrating today? What are your concerns of the day? To whom are you turning in these times?

The quotation above reminds me that God in Christ is always with us, protecting, accompanying, healing. I have prayed with it often. The Breastplate is a very long 5th century hymn in the style of Druidic poetry that is attributed to St. Patrick. Each verse begins with the phrase, "I arise today" or "I bind to myself today" and calls for the divine protection of God in the Trinity, God as Creator, God as Christ, God as Spirit.

Legend has it that St. Patrick sang this when an ambush was laid against him and his followers by the High King Leary to prevent him from going Tara to share the faith at the High King's seat of power. A miracle happened when it appeared to the soldiers that Patrick and his monks were a herd of wild deer. It is believed that they were protected

because Patrick and his followers were tasked with sharing the faith all across Ireland. I invite you today, and in the coming days, to consider using the portion of St. Patrick's hymn quoted above as a prayer of protection when you are anxious and remember that you are surrounded by love and light.

A Word About Current Pandemic Precautions: As the latest Covid-19 Omicron variant seems on the decline, the Deacons and I discussed at our monthly meeting recently how best to proceed with our protection protocols at MCC.

There are some **local metrics** to be celebrated*: As of Feb 22, our risk level remains High, it's two steps down from Extremely High. In the Bridgeport Metro area, our vaccination rate is 95% (for one dose), 80% (for two doses) and 36% (Completely Boosted). Hospitalizations and deaths are down (from their high on Jan 13), and the positivity rate is down to 4.8%, (of reported tests). Although we are not yet at a place where the numbers are deemed safe, they seem to be on a downward trend.

The **World Health Organization** defines pandemics, epidemics, and endemics based on a disease's rate of spread. While an epidemic can be quite large, it is also generally contained and does not lead to the same large-scale social disruption, economic loss, and general hardship as does a pandemic, which cuts across international boundaries.

Earlier in this pandemic, many experts agreed that the goal was to reach herd immunity, which is when enough of the population has been vaccinated or recovered from the infection that a resistance is built up, thus slowing the spread. However, now that we better understand how this virus mutates and spreads, and how immunity wanes over time, it seems that total eradication may be unlikely.

Many experts say that COVID will likely lose its "pandemic" status sometime in 2022, due largely to rising global vaccination rates. "If the virus does become more seasonal, wearing a mask on public transit and indoors during COVID season could become the new normal and other familiar prevention strategies, like regularly washing your hands and maintaining distancing practices in high-risk settings, could also stick around during seasonal spikes," said Dr. Albert Rizzo, Chief Medical Officer of the American Lung Association.

The Governor announced recently that he expects to lift the school/day care **mask mandate** on February 28th. This means that the decision to require masking in these settings will be placed in the hands of local school boards and communities. Please read the CE parents letter about masking in our children's and youth programs. As for MCC, we will continue to place public health awareness and the care for one another as primary reasons for our decision-making. Our protective measures have kept us healthy so far, so we will continue to **take a cautious approach and continue to mask indoors on Sunday mornings** as we wait to see if the current downward trend will hold.

Thank you for continuing to be so patient. Please continue to keep each other safe by maintaining holy distance and staying home if you or someone in your family has any symptoms. Deacons will continue to regularly evaluate our safety protocol and inform the congregation of any changes in program or policy. Thank you for your understanding and patience during this challenging time!



Christian Education

Dear MCC Parents: Throughout the pandemic, the Board of Christian Education has followed a mitigation strategy in Sunday School, Junior and Senior PF that has been in alignment with the Monroe Public Schools. By now you may have heard about the Monroe Board of Ed decision that public schools will be "mask optional" as of February 28, 2022. As we understand, this move was made after careful consideration of the new state guidelines and a review of our town's vaccination and COVID statistics.

Over time, we realized that there are some things about being part of a church community that are different from being in a school community. Schools can cohort, limiting interpersonal contact to a smaller group which also supports contact tracing. MCC has intergenerational contact on Sunday mornings. When we gather, we will naturally be in community with people of all ages, some of whom are immunocompromised, and others who are too young to be vaccinated. It is also the case that the transmission level for the virus remains high. For this reason, we will continue to require masking on Sunday mornings when indoors until further notice in worship and in Sunday School.

However, beginning Sunday, March 6 our <u>Junior and Senior PF evening programs will follow BOE guidance and implement a Mask Optional policy.</u> We are making this change because we believe that there is a very high rate of vaccination among the leaders and students in both groups, and it is a much smaller population in which to contact trace. All other mitigation strategies will remain in place, including but not limited to frequent cleaning and hand washing, maximizing ventilation, and staying home when ill.

Lastly, the choice to wear a mask is an individual's decision and no one should be made to feel uncomfortable about that decision. Some families may not feel ready to unmask. At MCC, we will continue to teach empathy and compassion for others. We encourage you to continue to have honest conversations at home about these and other difficult topics. Feel free to reach out to us if we can support you in any way. We expect that everyone will practice kindness and compassion as we get used to our "new normal".





Elisha's Corner

Pulpit Suppliers - John and Joseph Johnson

The last two members of the Ecclesiastical Society of New Stratford committee to "... provide a Minister or Ministers to preach ye Gospels among us" were brothers; John and Joseph Johnson. John was sixty-five at the time and his younger brother, Joseph, was fifty-four. They were the third and eighth children of George Johnson (II) and his wife, Hannah Dorman of Stratford. Information concerning John is sparse. He was born in Stratford on April 15, 1697 and grew up in the Ripton Parish. He was eighteen when his father died and he became the ward of Dr. Thomas Leavenworth of Ripton Parish who lived near Indian Well. He, his two brothers, Joseph and Robert, and sister Margret were bequeathed approximately thirty-three acres of woodland on Moose Hill in 1715; two years before the Ripton Parish (Huntington) was established. John's share was eight acres of the property plus half of the house the family had adjacent to the "Common land" (Huntington Green). As his legal guardian, and because John was eighteen, Thomas Leavenworth had probably taken John in as an apprentice at his shipyard on the Housatonic River. His other siblings, including Joseph who was only seven years old, remained with their mother in the family home. There are no records found that John had any children, nor was actually married. He remained on the Committee throughout 1762 and 1763 until he was replaced at the December 1763 meeting. He died in 1766, at the age of sixty-nine, four years after being selected.

Unlike his older brother John, Joseph Johnson was a signer of the original 1761 Memorial (a "Memorialist" for establishing the Parish). Born on January 22, 1708, he was married, had a growing family, and had inherited ten and a half acres of the wooded property on Moose Hill; so the two brothers may have lived adjacent to one another. At the age of twenty-seven Joseph married Rachael Meade of Greenwich on April 20, 1732 when she was twenty-three. They raised ten children; five girls, the first two were twins, and five boys. Their oldest child, James, became a minister. Joseph remained on the Committee for its first few years and was then replaced. He is cited in the Society minutes in later years being on a variety of other committees. It appears that, like his two brothers, he was well educated, but what they did for a living is undocumented, as is when he died. His wife Rachael died in 1748 shortly after the birth of their last daughter. They were both forty years old when she died, but unlike the normal custom to remarry with a young family to maintain, it appears that he did not. Their children ranged in age from infant to fourteen years old. He could have employed a housekeeper and/or nursemaid or received support from either of his two youngest sisters. And at the age sixty, he may have seen action in the Revolutionary War as a Corporal in 1778.

The brothers' father, George Johnson (II) was born in Stratford on March 27, 1660, to George Johnson (I) and Katherine Butcher. He must have traveled to England as an infant, because his sister Katherine was born in St. George late in the following year. Upon their return to the colonies, before October 1664 when his brother, Gershom Johnson was born, they had settled in Kingston, Somerset County, Maryland. At the age of twenty-one, after his father died, George (II) returned to Stratford to establish himself. It is an educated guess that he followed in his father's and grandfather's trade as a

cabinetmaker, or at least some form of carpentry. On January 4, 1695 he married Hannah Dorman, a Stratford maiden of nineteen. They had six daughters, one died in infancy, and three sons, John being the oldest and Joseph the youngest. Their residence was in the center of what would become the Ripton Parish. The acreage on Moose Hill was probably an investment purchase but proved valuable for his three sons' early inheritances. He died at the early age of forty-one on August 24, 1714. His widow, who did not remarry, despite the early ages of their children, lived anther ten years.

George Johnson (I), John's and James' grandfather, came from Canterbury, Kent, England, where he was born. He was baptized at the Canterbury Cathedral on April 3, 1625. In the spring of 1637, at the age of twelve, he and his six brothers and five sisters, father, Captain Edward Francis Johnson, and mother, Susanna Munter, took passage on the ship *Hercules* bound for New England. They settled in Woburn, MA, northwest of Boston. His father was a cabinetmaker by trade and later became a New England inland explorer, historian, first commissioned officer of Woburn, Town clerk, and the colony's General Court Speaker. When he became of age, George (I) returned to Canterbury and at age twenty-five, married twenty-year-old Katherine Butcher in the Canterbury Cathedral in 1665. Between then and 1660, when George (II) was born, they had immigrated to Stratford. They only had two boys and a girl; the last child, son Gresham, died in infancy. By 1664, he moved his family to Kingston, Somerset, Maryland, where he died at the age of fifty-six on December 23, 1681.

Canterbury, England is an hour and a half's drive of 62 miles southeast of London on England's southeastern corner.
