

Elisha's Corner

Affairs of the Congregation
(aka Skeletons In Our Closet)

If anything, the Victorian Era was noted for its penchant for propriety. Affairs of impropriety were neatly tucked away as the skeletons in ones closet, not to be discussed in general public. That does not mean that it was not discussed in private; indeed. That is why it is quite interesting that a few of our ancestral congregations during this period of time recorded what would have been "impropriety affairs." Their covenant duty was unabashed persistent patient care and oversight of their parishioners' spirituality.

Let's start with the Ezra and Polly Kirtland affair of 1843. Minutes of a council meeting held March 3, 1843, clearly describe "At the same meeting it was noted that Dea. Agur Beardslee, (Deacon Samuel B. Beardslee) and Foster M. Cargill be a committee to converse with Ezra Kirtland and Polly Kirtland, his wife, on the subject of their absenting themselves from the worship and ordinances of the Church - and to report the result of their conference to the church [the whole congregation] at a subsequent meeting". This task was not relegated to the then pastor, Rev. Robert Dexter Gardner, but to lay leaders of the congregation. Subsequently, on March 6th, three days later, it is recorded that the "committee appointed to visit Mr. Kirtland reported verbally in substance as follows: - That Mr. Kirtland, for reasons which he chose not to have mentioned, did for a space of about one Year, absent himself from public worship, in any Congregation, and that after that absence, he was invited by the Episcopal society in this place, to assist them in singing for which he was receive compensation, which he felt needful for him in his circumstances; ---- since which time, with the exception of a few short intervals, which have occurred between the close of one term of his employment there, and the commencement of another, he has been an attendant in public worship with that congregation. The Committee further reported that Mrs. Kirtland affirms as the reason of her absence, the wish to accompany her husband to the place where he attends public worship. They make no acknowledgement of having done wrong, but request, through the committee, a dismission from the church and a recommendation to the Episcopal Church." The congregation was not at all agreeable to Mr. Kirtland's request since, "it would be inconsistent with the order of the Gospel, under such circumstances to give Mr. Kirtland such letter of dismission and recommendation....and that the Pastor (Rev. Gardner) cite Mr. Kirtland to appear before the church" at a special meeting. At that meeting, held on April 14, 1843, "Mr. and Mrs. Kirtland were present and he having given satisfaction to the Church as to their absenting themselves from (the congregation's) worship and ordinances" were subsequently given the requested letter of dismission and recommendation to the Episcopal Church. The congregation considered its responsibility for the care and oversight of parishioners' spiritual wellbeing and that the absence of public worship for any length of time being physically able to be a disgraceful disregard for ones binding covenant. It must also have been an embarrassment that the Kirtlands chose the Episcopal congregation across the Green to them.

In 1845, meeting minutes indicate that the same Brother Foster M. Cargill was called upon by the Church, "to make a confession as his judgment and conscience should dictate with reference to an affair between him and the late Wm. Tucker which resulted in the death of the latter in consequence of a wound inflicted by the hand of the former." A confession of murder was later recorded with the church attesting the unfortunate result of Cargill's intoxicated insult of Mr. Tucker, followed by Tucker's assault on Cargill, he had responded in self defense. He remained a repentant sinner and on Sept. 29, 1850 was appointed to be a delegate to "...attend the annual meeting of the Consociation in Danbury ...". A year later at the "A meeting of the Church (held on Sept. 13th)..... (he) was appointed Clerk....". Note that the confession was recorded with the church and was twenty-three years after the New

Stratford Parish was incorporated into the Township of Monroe. Yet the apparent sinner was forgiven of his sin spiritually and publicly; which apparently included the shameful intoxication that precipitated the incident. To be publicly intoxicated during this period was a grievous sinful act as well.


Then there was the affair of Mrs. Nancy Blackman, who in June and July of 1851 was formally notified that she was "for a long time been absent from our worship and ordinances and has also been guilty of a breach of the Seventh Commandment [adultery], and when duly cited, has refused or neglected to appear before the church, or otherwise to give satisfaction there, be suspended from the communion of this church till she makes such confession as shall be satisfactory to this church". In September of that year she did, in fact, confess in writing through a letter dated "New Haven, August 13, 1851", stating in part that "before my marriage I was guilty of a breach of the seventh commandment, which I regard as not only a sin against the church with which I am connected, but as a sin against God. I now profess my sincere repentance for the sin, and hope for the forgiveness of the church while I look to God for pardon" It is not revealed with whom she had the affair (not for general public discussion, pray tell)), but both she and her husband were subsequently dismissed from the church on September 21, 1851 and "be recommended to the Howe St. Church in New Haven" for their spiritual care and oversight.

And finally, there is the recorded disturbing affair on June 5, 1856, of Mrs. Marietta A. Sherman, widow of Roswell Booth [very prominent church family] "who was delivered of a child about ten months after the death of her first husband, and in less than four months after her marriage to her present husband. She made no denial of her guilt, gave no sign of penitence, and expressed her desire to have her name taken from the records of the church." In response to this the church record states that Mrs. Marietta A. Sherman be and is hereby excommunicated from this church and that this excommunication be published

from the Desk [pulpit] on the Sabbath"; a very decisive punishment.

If we are looking for skeletons this Halloween, we need look no further than in our own church closet; called our church's archives. Boo!


