"The friend who can be silent with us in a moment of despair or confusion, who can stay with us in an hour of grief and bereavement, who can tolerate not knowing... not healing, not curing... that is a friend who cares." - Henri Nowen



Consider this.... All human beings need healing. We need healing of our experiences of loss, of our sense of moral failure, greed, and brokenness of body, mind, spirit, and relationships. We need social transformation and planetary healing and so we need to pray for personal, congregational, community and national healing.

I believe that Jesus' healing ministry represents a heightening of the energy that created the universe and

that is resident in our cells and souls. Jesus' healing ministry –and our own – is an expression of the powers available to us when we are fully in synch with our deepest selves, God, the well-being of others, and our environment. Then and now, Jesus' healing ministry is more than sociological and political, although it includes these factors, but it is also spiritual and physical in the most holistic ways possible.

In Mark 5:21-43 we hear two healing stories: the healing of Jairus' daughter and the healing of the woman with the flow of blood. One is wealthy, the other is impoverished. Both feel powerless as they call upon the only one who can help.

Jarius may have been suspicious of Jesus, but his daughter's condition broke down any sense of judgment he felt toward the healer from Nazareth. Jesus felt Jairus' pain, and nothing would stand between him and restoring this young girl to health.

The path to healing is often surprising and unexpected. On the way, a woman reached out to Jesus and is healed from what most scholars describe as a gynecological ailment. The woman's illness had alienated her from husband (if she had one) as well as family, community, and religion. She was a social and spiritual outcast (and, like so many people today), impoverished by the cost of health care. The woman thought that perhaps God was punishing her for some sin of which she was unaware. For her, the healing moment was now! In her desperation, she found the courage to face the crowds, the stares, and comments, and the risk of rejection from the healer. When she touched Jesus, the healing energy of the

universe was released. The power was so great that it unsettled the healer, who looked all around for the recipient of his energy. Healed, she approaches him elated but filled with fear and trembling at what she just experienced and how he might respond to her. She receives his final blessing, "Daughter, your faith has made you well."

Like so many of Jesus' healings, this story is many-faceted. Her faith is a factor, but not the only one. Healing is not about us, but a synergetic connection of our faith, the faith of others, our condition and previous behavior, the nature of the illness and medical responses, and God's ever-present goal of abundant life.

The healing of Jairus' daughter is also the result of the interplay of faith and divine power. Jesus dismisses the naysayers and allows only those who trust his diagnostic (she is not dead, but asleep) and healing power. Jesus creates a healing circle to bring about her recovery. In this we are reminded that healing is always a communal event, grounded in a community of faith that believes on our behalf. Our trust in God can be a tipping point from illness to health, opening up new pathways for God's healing power.

Can our church become a healing circle, opening us to God's energy of love that transforms cells and souls alike? When we say "yes" and let go of our fears and need for control, miracles occur, energies are released, not contrary to the laws of nature, but in accordance with God's vision of abundant life for all creation. May it be so, and may it be soon.

Connecticut, Massachusetts and Rhode Island Conferences vote to go forward Together, As One

The Connecticut, Massachusetts and Rhode Island conferences of the United Church of Christ made history on June 16, voting overwhelmingly to form a new unified Conference in which they will not only do ministry together, but to which they will invite other religious and secular organizations to join.



In separate plenary sessions held at their second joint Annual Meeting, the three conferences voted to approve a covenant agreement and new set of bylaws establishing the new conference, and they elected a new united Board of Directors.

"UCC History was made today," said the Rev. John Dorhauer, UCC general minister and president. "Signaling to the wider church that we can accomplish more together than apart, that we live in an interdependent world in which we all need each other, and looking to maximize the use of precious mission resources, delegates to this tri-conference annual meeting voted to carve out a new pathway for what we hope will be new life, new vitality, and new relevance."

"It is my fervent hope and prayer that covenant partners around the life of this denomination will likewise test their own vision and courage in response to a Holy Spirit who is inviting us to join Her in explorations and innovations that open us up to new possibilities," he continued.

A year ago, delegates from the three conferences voted to pursue the possibility of uniting; this year, they voted to give official form to the new, combined entity.

"Today we affirmed that we need each other," said Connecticut Conference Minister the Rev. Kent J. Siladi. "We attended to the Holy Spirit's movement in our gathering and we moved forward with a commitment to making an impact and making a difference in this God-so-loved world in which we live. Let it be said that at this gathering people of faith were filled with hope and joy, peace and love, and agreed that together we are called to live the love and justice of Jesus," Siladi said.

The Rev. Barbara Libby, Interim Rhode Island Conference Minister, said the vote shows that "in spite of all sorts of other differences, we do share the notion that following Jesus Christ does and will continue to transform us, our churches, and even our planet."

The Rev. Traci Blackmon, UCC Executive Minister of Justice & Local Church Ministries, preached at the Annual Meeting on Friday evening, and asked those gathered: "Have you ever trusted God enough to step into the water, not knowing how you would make it across?"

Her words resonated with many in attendance, who time and again the next day referred to getting their feet wet as a metaphor for daring to step into a new future together.

Before she left Saturday, Blackmon called the vote exciting and unprecedented. "It marks a change in ministry that's going to be needed for church to move beyond the walls again," she said. "We are fortunate that these three conferences are courageous enough to lead us in this."

The three historic conferences will remain in existence as voting members of the new conference, tentatively being called the Together, As One Conference. The new conference will need to be approved by the UCC's national governing body, General Synod, in June of 2019. The conferences will move to a single staff and budget starting Jan. 1, 2020.

The new Board of Directors – which consists of five members and two officers from each of the three Conferences - will now begin the task of determining how the new entity will be structured.

Conference leaders point to one aspect of the new conference as unique and unprecedented: it allows for other bodies who share in the vision, mission and purpose of the new conference to join as non-voting associate members. For example, the Annual Meeting of the Episcopal Diocese of Western Massachusetts last fall passed a resolution calling for a "Deeper Community, Service and Engagement" with "United Church of Christ Partners." Down the line, the Diocese could become an associate member of the new conference.

"For over 200 years Protestantism in America has offered a denominated witness to Christ's call for justice and love," said Massachusetts Conference Minister and President the Rev. Jim Antal. "Going forward we have an opportunity to come together. What we did today was a first step. We need institutions to carry the weight of social change. They also offer symbols that can bring people together. That's our profound hope."

"..... and We Shall Build"



This year, 2018, marks the 50th anniversary of the construction completion, opening, and dedication of our Rexford House. The actual dedication ceremony took place on Sunday, September 29, 1968; a quick eleven months after the

ground breaking ceremony that took place the previous year on a Sunday, November 19, 1967. The ceremony also dedicated the renovations made to Beardsley Hall and the Dineson Parlor. It was a weeklong celebration of a long, long awaited program completion that started formally five and a half years earlier on March 6, 1963 with the formation of a study committee by the Church Council. The acting chairman was Rev. W. Raymond Ward (1956 to 1966).

In January of 1964 the Survey Committee, headed by June Wilkes, presented their findings to the Council. In May of that year the members of the committee selected Curtis

"Bud" Morvec chairman of the group. By this time the Church Council was locked into "the dream built", as the Executive Building Committee later referred to the project. In June a Fellowship and Recreation report was presented by Max Hauenstein and a Christian Education report by Shirley Tibbits. Shirley also chaired the Furnishing and Equipment Committee. One can only assume that the survey and subsequent committee reports reflected the needs, desires, and expectations of the congregation for their recordings have yet to be found in the church archives. Maybe they will be in time for next month's story.

By July, 1966, the selection process for an architect was underway, and on September 13th Moderator Max Hauenstein assembled the congregation to hear the Building Committee's progress and results to date. By unanimous vote "...the meeting approved Mr. Henry Moeckel (and Associates) as architect." Serious attention was then initiated In November for the fund raising effort. After twelve weeks of preparation, the "Executive Building Committee became Project Executive Committee as requested in (a) letter from Board for Homeland Ministries of (the) United Church (of Christ) accepting our reservation for a fund program." Bud Morvec became the chairman, and the supportive Executive Building Committee was retained.

Meetings were held with the Board of Religious Education; Couples Club; Senior P.F.; Women's Fellowship; Church Council; Deacons; Trustees; Treasurer; and Financial Secretary to review "preliminary plans" for comments and suggestions on Feb 13th and 20th of 1967. By unanimous vote, the slogan ".... and we shall build" was adopted at a special meeting on April 10th, the same month Rev. Robert Keeling (1967 to 1974) started as our new pastor.

Forty-four men comprised the family pledge canvas team. Canvas Sunday was on June 18, 1967. The goal was to raise \$60,000 over a three year period from 1967 to 1970 to insure commencement of the building. A Men's Breakfast served by the Women's Fellowship was held on April 23rd. Leaving nothing to chance, Bud Morvec was chairman of the Building Fund Campaign. The campaign was a success and "exceeded (its) goal of \$60,000. As a result the congregation was called to a special meeting held on July 7, 1967 to accept the 'master plan" proposed by the architect. It called for two phases. Phase 1 was the new construction of our 7,860 square feet Rexford House, a 600 square foot addition to the parsonage, and Beardsley Hall renovations and equipment. The total cost of Phase 1 was \$185,000. Phase 2 was for a 4,600 square foot addition to the Rexford House costing \$75,000. Phase 2, obviously was never started and remains on the drawing boards.

As you can imagine, accepting all of this planning was not without some misgiving and apprehension. In today's constant dollars the \$60,000 campaign goal converts to \$457,000, and the \$185,000 project cost of Phase 1 coverts to \$1,409,000. How strong their faith was that it could be done? 'Twas "the dream built"!
