Facing Change: Tri-Conference Annual Meeting

"In the midst of new dimensions, in the face of changing ways; Who will lead the pilgrim people, wandering in their separate ways? God of rainbow, fiery pillar, leading where the eagles soar; We your people, ours the journey, now and ever, now and ever, now and ever, now and ever more." - In the Midst of New Dimensions, Julian Rush

Guess what else is Father's Day weekend, friends? A historic, first-ever Tri-Conference Annual Meeting of the Connecticut, Massachusetts and Rhode Island Conferences. Delegates to this Meeting, to be held June 16 - 17 at the Connecticut Convention Center in Hartford, will be asked to endorse a resolution unanimously adopted by the three Boards which calls for joining together to create a new Conference. If delegates endorse that resolution, the Boards will come back to a 2018 joint Annual Meeting with a specific proposal.

This change is coming because many of us in Southern New England believe we find ourselves in the midst of a critical moment in the life of our wider church. Like our pilgrim forebears who crossed the ocean confident that more light would break forth from God's Holy Word; like the four distinct traditions joining together in 1957 to form the United Church of Christ with a belief that unity in Christ transcended their differences; like the national setting which recently streamlined its own structure to create a nimbler approach to mission and ministry; we believe that discipleship in a new era requires boldness and change. We believe the time for the creation of a new Conference has come.

There are many compelling reasons to make this change now:

- ❖ It focuses and builds on what each conference does well, increasing congregations' access to resources, programs and consultations, sharing and implementation of "best practices."
- It creates a more nimble institutional platform better positioned to support new forms of ministry
- It offers a more robust technological capacity to help us share our mission and develop connections among churches

- ❖ A Southern New England Conference would exert greater influence simply because of its numbers, which can strengthen the mission and ministry of the UCC in this part of the country and serve as a model for other Conferences needing to take action to adapt.
- ❖ When we eliminate the boundaries of state lines, we may be more likely to challenge other boundaries as we come to see them as unnecessary and limiting.
- Embracing this act of interdependence will prepare us to work with other Christian denominations and people of faith. As the body of Christ, we can be a sign of the visible unity of the Church in our time.

I will be attending the Clergy Luncheon on Friday and the worship and plenary on Saturday morning before heading back to town to the PF Food booth at Strawberry Festival. On Sunday, June 25th, we welcome guest preacher Rev. Marilyn Kendrix to preach and lead a second hour adult education talk during coffee hour in Wilton Hall.



As people of conscience, we should care about the poor among us and in our society, the people who fit that description the best are the 7.3 million people currently under correctional control, 2.3 million of whom are in prison or jail, while the remaining 5 million are kept in a permanent poverty by the rules of parole and probation and the legal discrimination against them in housing, employment, and public assistance. There are clear connections between racism, politics, targeted enforcement of the War on Drugs and the intractable poverty that it creates. These issues have been out of sight for

most of us yet as people concerned with human justice; we need to become aware of this injustice in our midst.

As one of the authors of *The Justice Imperative: How Hyper Incarceration Hijacked the American Dream,* Rev. Marilyn Kendrix will discuss the facts and consequences of mass incarceration in America and provide some recommendations for what we can do about it.

Marilyn Baugh Kendrix currently serves at the Interim Senior Pastor at the Congregational Church Naugatuck. A graduate of Yale Divinity School, Marilyn worked for over 15 years as an Organizational Development Consultant principally at AT&T but also in other profit and not-for-profit settings. In addition to her ministry at the Naugatuck church, Marilyn is also a member of the Board of Directors of the Connecticut Conference of the UCC.

Marilyn earned her Bachelor's degree in French and secondary education from Spelman College in Atlanta, Georgia, her Executive MBA from the University of New Haven and an MA in Industrial and Organizational Psychology, also from the University of New Haven. In May of 2013, Marilyn received her Master's of Divinity degree from Yale Divinity School and a certificate from the Yale Institute of Sacred Music. She was the recipient of the Henry Hallam Tweedy Prize for exceptional promise in pastoral leadership, the highest prize that Yale Divinity School confers on a graduating student each year, for her work in raising awareness about mass incarceration in America.

Marilyn's covenant as Senior Pastor with the Congregational Church of Naugatuck allows her to preach and teach about mass incarceration at other UCC churches in Connecticut one Sunday a month. In addition, in her work with the Malta Justice Initiative, Marilyn has partnered with 7 other writers to write a book, *The Justice Imperative: How Hyper Incarceration Hijacked the American Dream* (September 2014, Significance Press). The book focuses on the problem of mass incarceration in Connecticut and provides 30 recommendations for bringing it to an end.

A Call for an End to the Occupation on the 50th Anniversary of the 1967 Arab-Israeli War June 6, 2017

"How long, O Lord? Will you forget me forever? How long will you hide your face from me? How long must I bear pain in my soul, and have sorrow in my heart all day long?" -Psalm 13:1-2a.

This week marks a half century since the watershed 1967 Arab-Israeli War. For Israelis, the military victory meant newfound access to and control over East Jerusalem, the West Bank, the Sinai Peninsula, the Gaza Strip, and the Golan Heights. For Egyptians and Syrians this event, called *al-Naksa* ("the setback"), meant the loss of important land areas. Sinai was eventually returned to Egypt, but the Golan Heights remains under Israeli control despite efforts to negotiate a return to Syria. For Palestinians, Israeli control of East Jerusalem, the West Bank, and Gaza has meant a half century of occupation, during which Israel has developed systems of separation and differentiation between its own citizens, including settlers, and Palestinians.

2017 is a significant year in the history of the Israeli-Palestinian conflict, as it marks the passing of several milestones:

- 120 years since the First Zionist Congress in Basel, Switzerland (1897);
- * 100 years since the Balfour Declaration's issuance (1917);
- * 80 years since the British Peel Commission recommended partition (1937);
- * 70 years since the United Nations voted to support plan of partition (1947);
- * 50 years since the war resulting in occupation (1967); and
- * 30 years since the beginning of the first Palestinian *intifada*, which included many organized acts of non-violent resistance (1987).

Far from a complete timeline, these events provide brushstrokes of the complicated history of conflict, and help illuminate the fact that the issues of demography and dignity, geography and resources, are at its heart.

"Consider and answer me, O Lord my God! Give light to my eyes, or I will sleep the sleep of death." Psalm 13:3.

For the Christian Church (Disciples of Christ) and United Church of Christ and their joint work in Global Ministries, the main focus of advocacy and engagement has been the occupation, which has now endured for half a century and is a major, but not the only, source of injustice. International law neither admits the acquisition of land by force, nor the transfer of population into occupied territory; Israel has violated both. We know from the relationships we have nurtured—primarily but not exclusively with the Palestinian Christian churches, institutions, and community—that the systems of discrimination and oppression have widened and deepened over the course of the occupation, with no end in sight. The conditions under which Palestinians live—including generations of refugees living in the occupied territories, neighboring countries, and beyond—have only devolved. The suffering has been witnessed by many in our churches who have made pilgrimage visits to the lands of our Christian faith's history, and who stand in solidarity sisters and brothers of Abrahamic faith heritage by seeking justice, peace, and equality of rights.

The Psalmist asked, "How long, O Lord?" We also ask, how long can this occupation continue, and how long can the dignity and rights of the Palestinian people be denied? As we call for an end to the occupation, we look to the scriptural imperative of a year of jubilee: "You shall hallow the fiftieth year and you shall proclaim liberty throughout the land to all its inhabitants." (Lev. 25:10). We reaffirm our commitments to seeking a resolution to this enduring and asymmetric conflict, to standing up for justice, and to participating in and supporting non-violent means to attain these goals including, but not limited to, the right to use economic measures to promote justice. We stand in solidarity with our partners in Israel/Palestine who endure the impact of occupation on a daily basis and who work tirelessly to respond to, cope with, and resist the systematic denial of rights and dehumanization which result from unjust policies and practices. We will continue to share the stories and perspectives of those too often ignored or suppressed by mainstream media. We recognize the disproportionate and slanted role that the US government plays in regional politics, and will continue to advocate for positive change which we believe would serve the interests of this country, as well as those of Israelis and Palestinians, and of others within the region.

We pray and yearn for an end to violence in all its forms, and reject and condemn anti-Semitism and anti-Muslim sentiment. We are guided by the premise that the fullness of life is too often subjugated to short-term political or economic interests, but that in the end, such narrow-mindedness is in no one's ultimate benefit. We trust in God that justice one day will indeed prevail.

"I trusted in your steadfast love; my heart shall rejoice in your salvation. I will sing to the Lord, because he has dealt bountifully with me." -Psalm 13:5-6.
