





Elisha's Corner By Gary Thompson, Church Historian Rexford's Roots

Three years ago the family roots were traced for the first leaders and formers of New Stratford Parish Ecclesiastical Society established in 1762. Their ancestors were all from England, of course, by way of our "mother town", Stratford, or through New Haven. David Willcockson's family was from Killingworth, Northumberland. Henry Hawley's family was from Derby, Derbyshire. Samuel Beardslee's (Beardsley) family was from Ilkeston near Nottingham, Andrew Hubbell's from Ribbesford in Worcestershire, Nathan Booth's from Parwich in Derbyshire, and John Moss' family migrated from Manchester. Jonathan Curtiss' family came from Nazeing in Essex and John and Joseph Johnson's originated from Canterbury in Kent. All of these locations are in the "middle region" of England, except for Canterbury which is in the south east on the English Channel coast, and they all migrated in the mid 17th century to create or enhance the colony of Stratford Plantation. It was not that way with the family of our first minister, Rev. Elisha Rexford, who ultimately solidified our congregation into the New Stratford Ecclesiastical Society on December 26, 1764.

Elisha's grandfather, Arthur Rexford I, came from Dartmouth in Devon, England, which is on the southwest peninsula on the coast the English Channel, and he did not migrate to the colonies until 1700. Dartmouth is situated on the west back of the River Dart estuary emptying into the Channel (ergo Dart-mouth). It was an established deep harbor parish as early as the 12th century with a population of a few hundred. Today the population is only a little over 5,000 people. Trade was naturally its main industry. It was from this port that many of the first Puritans embarked to the Massachusetts colony. Arthur Rexford I was born 19 June 1677 and baptized the following month in St. Petrox, an Anglican Church, on 1 July 1677. He was the eldest child of five sons and one daughter born in Dartmouth to Daniel John Rexford (1652 – 1696 of Plymouth) and Sarah Kelly (1655 – 1691 of Dartmouth). All of his siblings lived to adulthood and had families of their own.



St. Petrox, Dartmouth, Devon, England on the banks of the River Dart. This is the Anglican Church in which Rev. Elisha Rexford's grandfather, Arthur Rexford I, was christened on July 1, 1677.

It is not surprising that Arthur I became a mariner, trader, and later a successful mercantilist, given his early exposure to the harbor life. Early colonial records for the Connecticut colony indicate that he showed up in New Haven in 1700. Two years later, at age 25, he was married to Elizabeth Stevens, age 24 and daughter of Henry Stevens and Joanna Leek, both of New Haven. They were married on 3 September 1702 by John Alling, Justice of the Peace. Between 1703 and 1722, they had three sons and three daughters; Arthur II, Sarah, Philip, Daniel, Sr., Mary, and Elizabeth. They all lived to adulthood and had large families in the Connecticut colony. To maintain a prosperous family life in New Haven, Arthur I eventually became master of the trading sloop *Rose* that shuttled goods between the Massachusetts, Rhode Island, and Connecticut ports and the West Indies (frequently Antigua). It is not clear that the goods for trade included slaves. As "master" (owner), Arthur I needed to traveler these routes only twice yearly at most in order to set up and manage the sales and contracts of the cargo exchanges among the contracted customers. He rendered his maritime enterprises until he died at the age of 51 in New Haven on 1 February 1728. His wife, Elizabeth, died at age 63, in 1741.

Arthur I's second son, Philip, was Rev. Elisha Rexford's father. Philip was born in New Haven on 19 June 1708. However, there is no record of baptism until 26 September 1734, when he was age 26. He was admitted to the First Congregational Society of New Haven (where it stands today at the New Haven Green) three days earlier. It was at this church where he was married on April 15th of that year to Anna Beecher, age 24 and daughter of Joseph Beecher and Lydia Roberts, both of New Haven. Like his siblings he was a landowner and had an estate of undefined size in England, which he ordered to be disposed in his will. Also like them he may have engaged in land investments in the hinterland of Connecticut at the time. He remained a prominent figure in New Haven as a mercantilist. It is recorded in Connecticut Colonial records that he was a signer of the First Congregational Society of New Haven's petition to establishing the White Haven Society in order to handle their growing membership. Since his son, Elisha was baptized at the First Congregational Society, Philip and his wife, Anna, most probably remained members there. Elisha and his first wife, Lydia Munson, are shown to have been members of the White Haven Society in April of 1758. They were married at the White Haven Congregational Church on 30 January 1765, within six weeks of his ordination.

Unlike his older brother, Arthur II, who had 6 sons and 2 daughters that lived to adulthood, and his younger brother, Daniel, who had 3 sons and a daughter who lived to adulthood, Philip had only 3 sons and no daughters. His eldest son Elisha, born 9 January 1735, was baptized in the First Congregational Society of New Haven two days later. He died the following year. His second son - also named Elisha and who became our first minister - was born 24 October 1737, and was baptized in the same church six days later. His third son, Hezekiah, was born 9 October 1745, but only lived for less than three years. Twenty-four years late, in 1766, Philip's wife Anna died. On May 22nd of that year Philip remarried Mary Blakesley Ball, a widow of a recently deceased John Ball of New Haven. Philip died 30 May 1798 at the age of 90 and outlived his second wife by a few months. He was buried six days later, not three (interesting for the times).

Rev. Elisha Rexford was thus his father Philip's sole heir at the age of 61 and living in Huntington Township with his second wife Sarah and second daughter Lydia Mary. The total estate, not counting the estate in England, was approximately £200, which equates to \$6,360 today. By this time, though, Elisha was well established financially in his own right and he would only live another ten years. Sadly, Elisha had no sons of his own. He had another daughter, Ann Abigail (aka Nancy) Fenn, by his first wife, Lydia. Unless she had children Elisha's line ends, because his daughter Lydia Mary never married. Current Rexford descendants would have to be traced through his Uncle Arthur II's or Uncle Daniel's line, or through the line of his aunts Sarah, Mary, or Elizabeth; stories for another day.
