

#### **Looking for Trouble?**

Disguised as a hilarious comedy, *The Good Place* is in fact uncommonly profound, packed with clever observations about the human condition, faith, and cutting jokes ranging from the existential nature of frozen yogurt to the existential nature of, well, us. I've watched (and rewatched) every episode Netflix has to offer. One of my favorite quotes comes from a moment in season 4 when Michael (the Architect) says this to Eleanor (the main character, who the show is based on) at the end of a particularly frustrating day:



These strong words give them the courage to move on through a forking challenging time. (Part of the cleverness of the show is that no one can curse in The Good Place, I find that adorable.) I want to have that kind of faith like Michael has, but some days it's a stretch to figure out the next thing that has to be created, adapted or fixed. Hearing your stories and struggles makes me wonder if you sometimes feel the same way too.

It reminds me of what is said in James 1:2-4 "My brothers and sisters, whenever you face trials of any kind, consider it nothing but joy, because you know that the testing of your faith produces endurance; and endurance have its full effect, so that you may be mature and complete, lacking in nothing."

By placing our trust in God and relying on God's power for strength, growth and direction, we grow and mature through the difficult things of life.

We can so completely rely on God's care for us that we can be joyful when we see difficult times coming. Hang on... should we be saying, "YIPPEE! Another miserable day! More rotten stuff is happening to me! I'm so happy!"?

Well, ok, maybe that's a little over the top and people might look at you funny.

But if we can move in the direction of seeing God's hand guiding us through those difficult moments, helping us deepen our faith and trust, helping our character and endurance level grow, then perhaps we can see where James is trying to lead us.

Should we look for trouble in life? Probably not. But we needn't fear it either. As we move through life in faith, acting in love and living in forgiveness, we anticipate that growth and blessings will come (just perhaps not on our terms or schedule). By God's grace, we endure and grow and mature, and that realm of grace, love and forgiveness grows in and through us and the people we encounter. May it be so!



Nearly nine months into the fiscal year MCC is on track to conclude the year on budget. Similar to last year, MCC applied for and received \$39,511 under the Paycheck Protection Program (PPP) to help offset loss of other income. Pledge income, which makes up 60% of our budget, is holding steady and largely on budget. **A big thank you to everyone for staying current with your pledge commitments!** Strawberry Festival netted \$12,337 after expenses. And, despite having drawn \$25K from our investment reserves to help with liquidity earlier this year, our investment accounts have actually increased in value thanks to the performance of the stock market. Expenses to date are either running at, or slightly under budget, which we hope will continue. In other good news, MCC received confirmation this past month that it had fully satisfied all conditions for forgiveness of its original 2020 PPP loan of \$42,700 from Newtown Savings Bank. Many thanks to Fred Dubois, Bill Stadler and Frank Wittenauer for their work in seeing this through.



#### Elisha's Corner

## By Gary Thompson, Church Historian Our First Prudentialist, Andrew Hubbell

The third person to be selected at the organizational meeting of the New Stratford Ecclesiastical Society "...to take care of ye Prudentials of Sd Society..." was neither a signer of the "Memorial" to petition the establishment of the New Stratford Parish nor of a family that originally settled Stratford. Andrew Hubbell was one day shy of fifty-six years old when he was selected at that meeting. Another difference is that he served for only that year and the following year; 1762 and 1763. The minutes of the Society does not mention him after that, but his oldest child, son Elijah, was quite active in the business of the congregation having been selected to be tax collector in 1764 and remained in that capacity for a number of years following. Andrew was born June 22, 1706, in Stratford to Sqt. James Hubbell and Patience Summers. His grandfather was Sqt. Richard Hubbell, Sr. At the age of twenty Andrew married seventeen year old Sarah Parruck in Stratfield. She was from Fairfield. They had one son and four daughters. On July 20, 1736, at age twenty-seven, Sarah died. Her son was nine years old at the time. Her youngest daughter, Sarah, was only twenty-three months old. Four months later on December 2, 1736, Andrew remarried twenty-two year old Mary Welles of Stratford, and the Hubbell homestead became stable again. They had four sons and five daughters; a household of thirteen children. Their oldest, Elijah, was twenty-three years old when his step-mother, Mary, had her last child, Rhoda, who was born in April, 1751. The inventory of Andrew's will indicates that he was a famer, and with a young, large family the involvement in the parish governance may have been more than he had time or desire. Or it could have been that he left the Parish to join the Society in Easton where he presumably died. In our records the "Rate Bill for the Meeting House 1774 .... " does not list any of the Hubbell family members.

Andrew Hubbell's last will bequeathed his "house, barn, and 97 acres of land near Thomas Hawley land..." to his youngest son, Mathew who was at the time age thirty-two and with his own family; but he resided in Trumbull when he died and is buried there. To his son, Parruck, he left a small wooded parcel of land next to the property of Elijah Hawley. All this would indicate that Andrew's farm was on the Stepney side of the Parish. Interestingly in 1777, Andrew died on August 5<sup>th</sup> in Easton at age of seventy-one, his son Elijah died in Waterbury at age fifty, and his father, James, died Oct 1<sup>st</sup> in New Milford at age one hundred three.

Sgt. James Hubbell was at least by title a sergeant in the Fairfield militia. No record of his military service has yet been found to substantiate this. He was born in Fairfield in 1673 and spent his youth there. As his father Richard bought and sold properties in Fairfield and Stratford, he moved to the Stratfield Parish (northern Fairfield between Park Avenue and Blackrock Tpk.) where as a young man he met and married Patience Summers. He was thirty-one and she twenty-two. They must have moved from there to Stratford, since all of their children were born there; Andrew being the oldest. He later removed his family to a homestead in Easton, probably close to Stepney, since Andrew established himself in the New Stratford Parish. James and his wife Patience had two sons and three daughters. Their youngest daughter Patience was unmarried and move with them to Trumbull where she died in 1760 at the early age of thirty-eight. Her mother preceded her by seven years; she died on September 29, 1753 at the age of seventy. It may have been after his daughter's death when James moved again to establish the Hubbell famer in New Milford where he died at the age of one hundred three. He, his wife, and daughter Patience are all buried in the Unity Burial Ground in Trumbull.

The desire or necessity to move from place to place may have been an inheritance from James' father, Sgt. Richard Hubbell. In 1645, at age nineteen, Richard Hubbell arrived in the colony of New Haven, Connecticut from England. He was under the supervision of his maternal uncle, John Wakeman, a New Haven merchant and magistrate. On March 7, 1647, at age twenty-one he became a "Freeman", which meant that he was a property owner and subject to taxation. Four years later he married a local nineteen year old, Elizabeth Miegs, who was born in 1631 in Plymouth, Devon, England. With their first child, John, in hand they settled in Guilford in 1653, where they had three more sons and two daughters and where he was registered as a "Planter". The following year he took the "Oath of Fidelity" on May 4, 1654.

The History of the Hubbell Family, by Walter Hubbell (1915) indicates that in 1662 he got involved with others who endorsed two political papers (pamphlets) that were offensive to the "aristocratic government" of New Haven. They were all brought to trial for sedition. He, at least, was acquitted of the charge and was set free. Shortly after this incident he must have moved his family to the Pequannock section of west Stratford (now Bridgeport) where he established his homestead at what is now the corner of Clinton Avenue and North Avenue. He was a knowledgeable surveyor as well as a farmer and a realtor. He frequently bought and sold properties in the Stratford and Fairfield area for personal gain. The Family History .... claims that he earned the rank of Sergeant in the Fairfield County Militia, was a leading citizen, and an extensive landowner. He gifted portions of the properties to his children as they matured and set out on their own. But his wife did not benefit from this. She died on October 10, 1664, in Stratfield (Pequannock), leaving Richard with seven young children aged two to twelve. She is buried in the Old Stratfield Cemetery. He waited five years before he married his second wife, twenty-two year old Elizabeth Gaylord, who was born in Windsor, Connecticut on October 4, 1647. He was forty-three when they married. They added three more sons and three daughters to the family. The third child was James, Andrew Hubbell's father. Interestingly, of Richard's sons, two each were named John, James, and Samuel. Imagine that dinner table. At age forty-one, the second wife Elizabeth died in Stratfield and is buried in the Old Stratfield Cemetery, also. Her death may have been due to child birth. Within the year Richard, now sixty-two with a new baby to care for and at least four more older children still at home, married his third wife, Abigail Prudden, a forty-one year old widow, who was born in Milford on February 13, 1647. He had one more son by this last wife. Abigail lived in the Stratfield residence until she was seventy years old. She died on January 18, 1717 and is buried in the old Congregational Burying Ground in Stratford; probably next to her first husband.

It must be noted that Richard Hubbell was an original member of the Stratfield Ecclesiastical Society and a signer of the memorial issued to establish the Stratfield Parish. He died on October 23, 1699 and is buried in the Old Stratfield Cemetery with his two wives named Elizabeth. His headstone reads: "He was born in England 1626 Died in America 1699 Founder of the Hubbell Family. Richard was born on January 22, 1626, in Ribbesford, Wyre Forrest District, Worcestershire, England. Today Ribbesford is a village and civil parish that is part of the Town of Bewdley with a population of less than 300 people and within twenty-three miles southwest of Birmingham.
