Together As One

Did you figure it out? The answer lies somewhere in this Steeple - happy searching! Now that I've got your attention, I wanted to share with you something that happened last month in the life of our wider church. I've mentioned at Bible study, at the Retired Men's group, at Faith on Tap, in worship and in other leadership meetings that the Connecticut Conference of the United Church of Christ was engaged in a year of discernment about uniting ministries with the Rhode Island and Massachusetts conferences. At the annual "Tri-Conference" meeting in June, the delegates and clergy of these three historic groups decided to do just that! Here's the mission statement that has come out of the time of discernment:

Following Jesus' call to discipleship, and bound by the covenant we share as siblings in Christ, we – the members of the United Church of Christ in southern New England – declare these values essential to our shared ministry together:

- We understand the **local church exists to make disciples of Jesus** and we welcome all people unconditionally to share in this calling.
- We commit to **making God's love and justice real** by loving our neighbors, children, and all of creation through our collective work, such as seeking racial, economic, environmental, and LGBTQ justice.
- We believe God calls us to **bring new life as agents of change** and so we embrace and encourage adaptive and transformative leadership wherever the Body of Christ is gathered.

- We encourage local congregations and varied ministry settings, inspired and guided by the Holy Spirit, to **form covenant partnerships** with all who work for the common good in their local communities and throughout the world.

I believe there are many compelling reasons to move toward the creation of a new conference. It gives us the opportunity to build on what each legacy conference does well (sharing assets), which can help spark renewal and vitality among the churches. It will increase our local church's access to resources, programs and consultations – there are things that the Massachusetts and Rhode Island conferences do really well that we might learn more about! A new conference will establish a more nimble institutional platform which will be better positioned to support new forms of ministry. Joining together is already leading to a more robust technological capacity. This can help us share our mission, develop new connections and maintain deeper relationships than we already do.

The proposed change still needs the final approval of General Synod in June 2019. The final proposal allows the three historic conferences of the UCC in Southern New England to maintain dedicated financial resources and legacy gifts while conferring flexibility and establishing economies of scale.

Heading to the Rez

Greetings all! On Saturday, August 11th, I will be flying out to the Cheyenne River Sioux Reservation for an extended stay. I will return on Sunday, September 2nd. This year I have received a grant from the Fairfield East Association to implement a program for the Reservation's Adult Residents that I created. I have felt a call to work more closely with the adults living on the Reservation and have worked with Simply Smiles staff to create a short pilot program that will hopefully be continued and expanded upon. I am excited and grateful to be able to do this for these people that I have grown to respect and love.



That being said I also would like to put together a mission trip out to the Reservation for 2019. I have had conversations with a few of you about the cost of these trips and I hear you! I want you to know that in the 6 years that I have brought groups out, no participant has paid more than a \$200 deposit. Here are some ways that we at MCC can defray costs:

- Book flights early (my flight, booked in April, cost me \$425.00)
- Ask the Outreach Board for a contribution (I have done a soft ask)
- Ask Mustard Seed for a contribution (I have done a soft ask)
- Do a fundraiser at Board and Brush in Monroe
- Do a fundraiser at Chip's Restaurant in Trumbull
- Do an envelope fundraiser (Write dollar amounts from \$1 and higher. Put envelopes on a board or wall. Advertise your fundraiser. People take an envelope and put that amount of money in it to donate)

- Devote one worship service to Simply Smiles (have Bryan Nurnberger come and speak; take a special collection)

This trip is open to anyone age 15 and over. Also, there is a brand new bunkhouse for volunteers so there is no more sleeping on the floor in the Community Center. I hope you will join me on this important mission and if you cannot come on the trip, I hope you will support our endeavor.

Volunteers assist Habitat for Humanity in Vicksburg

Last week, Habitat for Humanity and Vicksburg Family Development got some outside help. On July 16, a group of 38 volunteers — 12 adults and 26 teenagers aged 13-18 — from Monroe Congregational Church in Monroe, Connecticut, arrived in Vicksburg to work on two Habitat homes under construction on Roosevelt Street, help with repairs at Vicksburg Family Development and replace a roof at a home on Spring Street.

The group also toured the Vicksburg national Military Park and went to eat at Walnut Hills.

“We do a mission trip every summer, and we do a mix of urban and rural,” said Jimmy Viglione, one of the adult supervisors working with the group. “This year is a rural trip. I’ve

been pushing for Vicksburg for about 10 years, now because I knew about the AmeriCorps presence here, but the drive is such a long drive, it's about 24 hours. This year, we decided to make a longer push. I called some individuals who put me in touch with Gertrude Young at the city of Vicksburg Housing Department. She had so much work for us. The more people we spoke to, the more projects that became available."

He said the members of Hawkins United Methodist Church invited them to stay at the church. "They were so welcoming, this trip became obvious," he said. "That's not an affiliate of our church, so it's strange to be so welcomed by a denomination that's not our own, so it was a really special gift for them to open their doors to us."

While one group of volunteers worked on the Habitat homes, another group was at Vicksburg Family Development making repairs to a flood damaged area at the center. "We're painting and doing drywall work over there," Viglione said.

"It was amazing; it was so wonderful" said Leanne Katzenmeyer. "At one point in time, all 38 were in this building doing something during that week." Katzenmeyer said Home Depot donated the materials for the repairs at the Family Development office on Monroe Street. "We were blessed beyond measure. They came from so far just to help us get into this building. We can never repay them, and (director) Kay (Lee) feels the same way."

Habitat director Abraham Green said the group's work "is a big help; it makes us feel better. It helps us know that our work is not in vain. We've made some progress. The big thing about it is gives them (the students) a really good opportunity to learn about community involvement, giving back spiritually, serving and helping others." Green worked with the teens to show them some of the basic skills to work on the house. "They catch on fast," he said. "They know they're helping out and they want to be good. Just knowing the desire to help is there; that means a lot. It encourages us to continue."

Viglione said the group raised funds to buy the materials to roof the home on Spring Street, which was to have been done Friday. He said the homeowner on Spring has had the leak for three years, but was unable pay to have the problem fixed. He said there was more than the need and AmeriCorps that brought the group south. "There's so much history here dating back obviously to the Civil War," he said. "It's important for us to try and expose our youth group to different cultures and environments that they're not accustomed to, and we thought of Vicksburg having so much history and such a racially diverse area. "Where they (the students) are in Connecticut is not nearly as diverse as it is here in Vicksburg."

The group left early Saturday morning for Roanoke, Virginia, the first leg of their return home. "We feel so grateful to be invited to your city and we get so much more out of this trip than the work that we're doing," Viglione said. "We feel so indebted to Vicksburg and all the people we worked with. Everybody in the city are really special to us, so we want to say thank you to every body we've met."

"..... And So They Built



The "dream build" conceived by a few would be a reality for the good of the current church children and those of the future. The records show that acceptance of the building plan for the new education build, to be called Rexford House, was nearly unanimous (2 not in favor out of 60 at a special congregation meeting March 13, 1967). The records also show that the survey of the congregation of 1966 - 67 and subsequent committee reports did reflected the needs, desires, and expectations of the congregation.

The detail of these surveys was translated into the descriptions and requirements of the new building; the original thought of a stage in fellowship hall gave way to more general space for large classroom space. And the contract called for two regulation shuffle board courts to be inlaid in the fellowship hall flooring. The courts disappeared years later when new flooring had to be installed.

A town wide questionnaire was sent to "73 organizations ... as to probable usage of our new building". The Building Fund Campaign had exceeded the goal of \$60,000 over a period of three years, providing \$60,638 in cash and pledges, as of July 25, 1967. These included large pledges and cash donations from local businesses and foundations. Half way through the first three years, however, pledges were behind, large pledges moved away, and some were not kept at all. That sounds somewhat familiar fifty years later. Yet it was this very situation that caused the creation of the Mustard Seed Shop and the Strawberry Festival. God does work in unperceivable ways to perfect His will.

The building contractor was Bryan Hodges of Walcott. The contract was signed December 20, 1967, and excavation began before the year ended, almost four months after the planned start date. Cost of the "Proposed New Church Facility", including renovations to Beardsley Hall, was \$159,764 of the total project cost of \$185,000. A mortgage of \$170,000 was entered into with the Peoples Savings Bank. Excluded from the contract was all the required plumbing and plumbing materials, installation of "all kitchen equipment, cabinets, and built-ins". This work was donated by members of the congregation, like Dick Whitcher who provided the plumbing materials and installations. Also excluded from the contract was the planned 600 square foot addition to the parsonage.

Renovations to Beardsley Hall included removing the kitchen, converting the main hall where the Mustard Seed Shop is presently into a large kindergarten classroom, and providing a nursery room in back of the kindergarten where a Gingerbread Preschool classroom now resides. The additional two large classrooms for primary grades were also provided and currently exist for the Gingerbread use.

The planners for the Rexford House project expected the 366 active members in 165 families, and 270 enrolled children through grade 12, including nursery children in 1967, to more than double in ensuing years. These projections were extrapolations based on the growth projections for the Town of Monroe. While over the course of fifty years, which we celebrate this year, Monroe has most certainly doubled in population. Our church growth, on the other hand has grown to our current 485 active members in 174 families, and 59 enrolled children through grade 12, excluding nursery children. While this may seem falling far short

of the 60's congregation expectations, it can be considered much better than most; much, much, better. If nothing else, Rexford House provides us with the intended capacity to grow without limited constraints; "... thy will be done". It is this 60's congregation that we owe a doubt of gratitude for not only their thoughtful vision, but their faith to have made it a reality.
