A Victorian Christmas

It was around this time last year that our church's historian, Gary Thompson, approached me with a great idea. He had noticed there are many tree lightings in town and wondered if we could combine efforts, making it more of a community event. What a great idea!

After the excitement of the Christmas season waned, we gathered folks from the Monroe Historical Society, St. Peter's Episcopal Church, Washington Masonic Lodge #19 and our Fellowship team to find out what we might offer the town. Soon, Benedict's Home and Garden came on as a supporter, offering a tractor drawn carriage that will shuttle folks from one site to another.

Such great energy around the table! We settled upon offering our community a Victorian Christmas event on December 1, 2019 (Save the Date!!!)

Why the Victorian Era? Encompassing Queen Victoria's reign from 1837-1901, this post-civil war era saw many changes in the town of Monroe. Among them, was the growth of St. Peter's Episcopal Church (having been established 30 years earlier in 1807) and the construction of the second (current day) Meetinghouse of the Monroe Congregational Church in 1847.

Religion was an important part of the Victorian American culture because it was a time when energies were focused on training ministers, missionaries and theologians. In the congregational church, the festival known as Christmas became more accepted and celebrated, with the addition of fun and festive traditions from Europe like Christmas trees and the like.

In this Steeple, please look for the flyer that we are sharing with the Monroe Community. Events include Sunday morning services in the Victorian Style, and a little later in the afternoon, church tours and open houses, strolling carolers and refreshments. And of course, our traditional tree lighting at 5pm!

Here's some simple tips you might choose to implement, should you plan on coming in period dress:

For ladies:

- High-collared shirts or turtlenecks, brooches
- Anything made of lace (like gloves)
- Long A-line skirts (fitted at the natural waist and flares out at the bottom)
- Peasant blouses and/or vests
- A cape (believe it or not, tree skirts work really well for a cape!)

For Gentlemen:

- Stovepipe hat (top hat) and white gloves
- High-collared shirt with a simple bow tie and vest
- A dark colored cape (see above)

Loaves, Fishes, and Pumpkin Carving

On October 26th we had a great time with fellowship and fun carving our Halloween Jack-O-Lanterns, but for as much fun as it is it can also be anxiety producing for folks who like to plan ahead.

The Pumpkin Carving Party is what I refer to as an "organic" event. We provide space and some other items, but it really just comes together by the people who show up – and that is never a definite either. What started out as planning for 3 pizzas, salad, cider, and some cookies, ended up being what we planned for plus four trays of cookies, pumpkin mini muffins, candy corn and peanuts, decorations, and a huge cauldron of Halloween candy!

This got me thinking about the Bible story of the Feeding of the 5,000. Did you know that it is one of the stories that is in all four Gospels? This means it is probably true! Some people think of this story as one of Jesus' miracles, but I think of it more as a story of people. People willing to take risks such as leaving their homes on foot to go see and hear Jesus without plans about where to sleep or what eat, and people willing to give Jesus all that they had. Jesus was that important to them.

After a day or more of walking, and listening to Jesus, the people became hungry and some of the Disciples became anxious. "How will we feed these people?" they asked. There was a boy had 5 barley loaves and 2 fish and he gave them to Jesus. Those loaves and fish were all the boy had and he gave them to Jesus.

Scripture says that Jesus told everyone to sit down, took the loaves and gave thanks, then passed the loaves around and all were fed – with 12 baskets to spare. In the Gospel of John we are told that there were 5,000 men so the head count did not include women or children. The total number of people fed that day could have been 10,000 to 15,000!

Some think of this as a miracle, but what I think happened is that Jesus showed the people the example of the boy, willing to give all that he had, and they responded the same way also giving Jesus all of the food they carried with them. When they put all that they had together it was enough for everyone and 12 baskets to spare!

God is like that, when we give all that we are and all that we have to Jesus it becomes more than enough with plenty to spare. What will you give?

Listen for the silence, receive the message

Have you ever noticed that when we finish reading a book or article, having a conversation, listening to our favorite podcast, or watching our favorite news show, that if we immediately move on to the next thing in our busy lives, we don't give ourselves the opportunity to reflect on what we just heard or read and on what its significance may be to us? We just move (rush) on to the next thing! "**Next!**"

You may have noticed a couple of times recently in worship, immediately after the sermon, we had a moment of silence. The purpose of that is to give ourselves the opportunity to reflect on the message we just received and its significance...before we move onto the next thing, be it the next hymn, coffee hour, an after-church errand...

Let's take a moment before we get to that next thing, right after the sermon, to de-clutter our minds, think about the meaning of what we just heard, and figure out what, if anything, we might want to do differently as a result of the message we received. For example, we might ask ourselves:

What message did I just hear? What is the significance to me? Did I have an "aha" moment? What might I try to do differently in my life, or today or next week, as a result? Why did Jesus do what he did – what was the lesson he was teaching to his followers? What was the point? What is the moral of the story for me?

Listen for the silence. Reflect. Take a deep breath. Take a moment.

New! The Simply Smiles Children's Village

On the Cheyenne River Sioux Tribe Reservation in South Dakota, an overwhelming number of Lakota children are unsafe in their homes. This has left the tribal, state, and non-governmental social services infrastructure, by their own admission, insufficient to respond to the demands and complexities of this dire situation. To protect these children, and to help them to overcome an unspeakably difficult start in life, Simply Smiles has

begun the process of building and managing the first-of-its-kind Simply Smiles Children's Village in the Reservation town of La Plant. These children possess the talent needed to finally break a generations-long cycle of suffering and dependence. To do so, they need our support. The Simply Smiles Children's Village is an incubator for that talent. It protects and provides for Lakota children. When they arrive at our door, they are at their most vulnerable. With your backing, they will leave at their most influential. They will have become strong Lakota men and women. They will have vision and confidence. They will be leaders.

Mission Statement: Guided by the principle of the Lakota kinship tiospaye and rooted in traditional values, the mission of the Simply Smiles Children's Village is to foster Native children to become leaders, role models, and Lakota citizens of the world.

- 1. To offer a child placement option on the Cheyenne River Reservation that fulfills the letter and spirit of the Indian Child Welfare Act by keeping Native children who have been removed from their homes, on the Reservation, with kin and community.
- 2. To support the reunification of children with their biological families.
- 3. To inspire and empower the children in our care to define themselves as Lakota.
- 4. To create a safe, inspiring, resource-rich environment for children.
- 5. To provide access to high quality education.
- 6. To foster tomorrow's Native leaders and role models.
- 7. To create a scalable model that can be replicated throughout Indian Country.
