
In Memory of Sue Zaleha

Working Together



I am so happy that it is September. I had a pretty low key summer due to a health issue, but am on the mend and am happy to hear that Pastor Jenn has chosen the theme "Working Together" for our upcoming year!

During Lent and the summer of 2019 we added two multi-generation offerings which were very successful and for our upcoming year we will be adding more offerings at different times. This reminds me of Messy Church which originated in England and has begun to take hold here in the USA.

On Saturday, September 21st, Ann Marie Campbell and I will be attending Messy Church Training. There is room to add a few more people to our MCC group so if you are interested, please contact me ASAP.

WHY "MESSY"? Part of the inspiration for the Messy Church name comes from Pete Ward's book Liquid Church. He describes faith families as fluid, as opposed to walled structures with insiders and outsiders: "The boundaries have started to become more fuzzy and less well defined." With its liquid edges, Messy Church is geared toward people of all ages and backgrounds, churched or un - churchd. It especially emphasizes reaching individuals and families who wouldn't attend otherwise, whether they're busy with sports on Sundays or are uncomfortable with traditional worship, whatever the reason.

Leaders point out that Messy Church isn't a craft club or a children's program—or any type of "program," for that matter. It's actual church, though it looks different from most worship services. In a nutshell, Messy Church is a regular opportunity for intergenerational worship, learning, and fellowship. The purpose is to explore God's love in a welcoming, accessible way through fun, faith, and food. "It's church for everyone," says Justin Welby, Arch - bishop of Canterbury. "It's a circle of all ages meeting together to engage in who God is in a way that works for them."

At the heart of Messy Church are these five core values:

- **Christ-Centered** - The goal of every gathering is to share the gospel and grow God's kingdom. theory, ministry is rather straightforward: Share Jesus' love and his gospel message with all people.
- **Intergenerational** - Everyone meets together, without the "age silos" common at most churches. People learn with one another and from one another, leading to deeper, lasting faith.
- **Celebration** - This doesn't necessarily mean jumping up and down, though that sometimes happens. According to Messy Church USA executive director Roberta Egli, celebration "involves sharing the abundant life Jesus offers as well as the ups and downs of our messy lives."
- **Creativity** - Worshipers use all five senses to experience and explore God's Word.

- **Hospitality** - Some type of meal or food sharing is always involved so people can enjoy conversation around tables.

Messy Church uses a once-a-month format, usually meeting midweek or on Saturday. A typical two-hour gathering includes a welcoming activity based on a Scripture theme and then four or five games, crafts, and science experiments. Instead of being expected to sit quietly and listen, kids interact with the lesson through their senses—touching “pig slop,” building a temple out of cardboard boxes, tasting resurrection buns, and so on. Next comes celebration time, with songs, prayers, and more reinforcement of the Scripture lesson. Following that is a meal so people can continue connecting and forming relationships.

Elisha's Corner

In Deed



While looking through the archives for property deeds in an effort to find the explanation of how it was that the Monroe Park Association owned the Centre Green and sold it to both our church and St. Peter's church, I found two deeds for the property upon which our current meeting house stands. This led to a file containing the contract to build the current meeting house. More than that, the description of the property in the first deed, by date, clearly and convincingly identifies the site of the first meeting house built between 1763 and 1769. You might remember that during our 250th year we had the State Archeologists' perform some underground site sonic plots between the parsonage and the meeting house as well as on the north end of the Centre Green in search of any stone foundation of our first meeting house. The effort did not yield the existence of any such formation. Thus the question of its location remained unanswered.

The first deed is a deed of trust. The property was sold (given) to the Congregational Society by Deacon Nathaniel Wheeler for one dollar, But first it was put in trust until the church figured out "... the size and proper style and designation ..." of the Meeting House. The Trustee was Henry Curtis, a member of the church and owner of the property in the then center part of the current Centre Green. On August 7, 1847, the following was entered into the Town of Monroe Land Records by the Town Clerk.

"Know all men by these presents that I Nathaniel N. Wheeler, of Monroe in the County of Fairfield State of Connecticut for consideration of one dollar received to my full satisfaction of Henry Curtis of said Monroe to hereby give grant bargain sell and confirm unto the said Curtis one certain tract of land situate in said Monroe in quantity eighty feet in front and one hundred feet in depth the same being the tract upon which the foundations of the new

*Congregational Church about to be erected in the Centre of Monroe are now placed. The front of said tract being nearly in line with the front of said church extending Easterly from the eastern side of said Church twenty-two and one half feet, and Westerly from the western side of said Church twenty-two and one half feet, and said tract running back in a uniform breadth one hundred feet from the front line thereof bounded as follows **Southerly by the highway and the site of the Society's old church** and on all other sides by land of grantor.....”*

Yes... the old church Meeting House across the highway (Church Street) on the north end of our Green. Interestingly, Deacon Wheeler retained all of his land around the 75 x 100 foot parcel (the foundation was 30 feet wide).

The second deed, dated January 4, 1849, conveyed this property from Henry Curtis, property trustee, to the Congregational Society of Monroe, for one dollar. The new Meeting House had already been built on it and was in use as of June 21 – 22, 1847. As we knew it was built by Hotchkins Clark & Co. of Derby and erected in the month of June; finished enough for worship services. The contract required that it be completed for use by November 1st. It also provided some interesting answers to some pending questions, like the bell and yoke in the belfry. The agreement gave Hotchkins Clark & Co. “...full and exclusive right to all materials composing said building and to all fixtures excepting **the bell, bell rope,** lamps, books, cushions, stoves, stove pipe, fuel oil, and materials of all kinds and such personal property as may have been placed or left in slips or pews by the occupants thereof.” Therefore, it is assumed that the bell was saved for use in the new (current) Meeting House, which included the yoke. The full story of our bell needs to be continued in a subsequent Steeple article, though. As for the Park Association’s possession of the Centre Green it is still under investigation, so no more can be said at this time. That full story, too, will be the subject of another Steeple article.
